

The Cherwell Studentship

The Cherwell Studentship, administered by the American Friends, is made possible by a generous grant from an anonymous donor, and is designed to support a young scholar in research and Symposium attendance. It is open to anyone who will not have reached her or his 31st birthday by the opening day of the Symposium and provides an unrestricted \$1,000 research grant, plus reimbursement of travel expenses to and from the Symposium and Symposium fees, including two-nights' stay in College.

The application consists of: a proposal of not more than 1200 words describing the research project and how the funds will be used to advance the project; proof of eligibility, such as a passport or driver's license; and a resumé or CV

Cherwell proposals need not follow the Symposium theme, although the judges especially welcome proposals that are relevant to the programme. Submissions for the Cherwell Studentship should be emailed to cathykkaufman@verizon.net no later than February 1, 2017. Tradition demands that the recipient remain undisclosed until she or he presents her or his paper at a plenary session during the Symposium, but past recipients of the Cherwell are:
